All of these items will affect us within the MHJA, but hopefully our voices will be heard through our Zone representatives and MHJA members that can attend the annual meetings. As these challenges arise, I want to highlight how the MHJA community worked together to better our sport. This year the Hott Horse Show management team and the Mid States management crew really took the time to evaluate the support of their respective shows. They looked at daily schedules, where the shows fell on the calendar,

and the demographics of their exhibitors. They worked together and came up with a new schedule that we will implement this year. Mid States will now run two horse shows in September, and no horse show in May, while Hott Horse Shows will run two shows in May and two shows in August. It is our hope that these changes will provide a better amount of exhibitor support to all of the MHJA recognized horse shows. Another way that the MHJA members have really stepped up is the support of the MN State Fair. We have gone from having virtually an empty horse barn and at risk of losing the horse show, to currently being over sold by 50 stalls. The Hunter/Jumper trainers got together and gave up tack, feed and grooming stalls to insure that all of the H/J exhibitors could get in Everyone really worked together to help make the Great MN Get Together a fun experience for all.

We find ourselves nearing the end of show season as this issue of the Newsletter comes to print. Hopefully everyone has reached, or is very near to reaching their equine short term goals, and long term goals are on the horizon. Some of you may be looking forward to a brief break after Harvest, others may already have their homework set up for the next step in their training regime. Of course everyone is looking forward to getting together at the annual Open Meeting, and of course the Year End Awards Banquet. As the season winds down I ask that you all take a moment to appreciate what the horse community brings to your life, as well as what you bring to the local and or national horse community. I'm not asking that everyone have a love fest, but instead a few moments of reflection and gratitude.

My most sincere thanks to each and every one of you that has helped get a child involved with horses, volunteered your time to assist horse show management, expressed thanks to our horse show secretaries (whom work tirelessly to make things happen for each of us), or simply enjoyed your horse and been thankful for the world that is available because of him/her. A very wise client of mine used to say, "A bad ride (round, horse show, day of riding) is better than no ride at all." Truer words could not be spoken.

Enjoy your equines, your barn mates, your braiders, your trainers, and be thankful!





In 2004, Sara Hogan was looking for a dressage horse for herself and a jumper prospect for her daughter, Kelly. Trainer Johnny Salazar had recently started two young horses at a barn in Prior Lake, and thought they were a great match for the mother-daughter duo. "Guilder" and "Gandalf"—4 year old half brothers!—soon became part of the Hogan family, though not in the capacity that Sara had originally envisioned. "We soon discovered that Guilder wanted no part of being a jumper! He was a hunter through and through," Sara says, "The following year Kelly stopped riding and I started jumping, and he became my first hunter. He's now 17!"

Stopping by Greenwood Stables/JSL Equestrian at the recent Summer Maffitt Lake shows, it was easy to see why

Guilder has remained a part of Hogan's string for almost 13 years. Not only is he a striking bay hunter, but he's full of personality! Here are some of the things we think you should know about him.

Does Guilder have a barn or nickname?

Sara Hogan: He doesn't really have a barn name, but I sometimes call him Gil, and Johnny calls him Guilderoo.

What has he shown in with you? With Johnny?

SH: Guilder and I began our hunter careers together. We started out doing Rusty Stirrup and Long Stirrup. We moved up to Limit Adult after a couple of years, and then to the Adult Amateurs where we have been showing for many years now. Johnny started him in the baby greens and went up through the pre-greens and greens. He has also



shown him quite successfully in many hunter derbies.

What are some of your favorite memories/highlights with Guilder?

SH: Some of my favorite memories are winning our first blue ribbon in a Rusty Stirrup class at Alpine, winning the Adult Amateur 50+ year end championship, and Guilder

receiving the MHJA High Point Hunter award. I've also been so proud of the way Guilder has performed in Wellington where he has placed in quite a few large classes. A big highlight from last winter was when he scored an 80 and 83 in back to back rounds during hunter week at WEF.

What is Guilder's daily schedule/routine?





SH: At home, Guilder is turned out every day with his brother, Gandalf. I call Gandalf "Guilder's security blanket" because I think he is most content when Gandalf is with him. Guilder works Monday through Friday and has the weekends off. Monday is always a lunging day which allows him to stretch out and work without a saddle. The horses stay out all day, weather permitting.

What are Guilder's favorite treats and "activities?"

SH: Guilder's favorite treats are carrots, apples and peppermints. He is always hopeful of getting treats, but is never nippy, and will lick every last bit out of your hand. He cannot have any grain or treats that contain wheat as we discovered several years ago after he had a severe bout of inflammatory bowel disease that he is gluten intolerant. His normal diet consists of hay, beet pulp and a wheat free vitamin and mineral supplement. His favorite activities are grazing and hanging out with Gandalf, followed by trail riding along the canals in Wellington.

Is there anything he doesn't like?

SH: Sadly, Guilder is not a fan of doing under saddle classes. If there are more than three horses in the ring, he gets fired up and wants to charge around in a very unmannerly way. Definitely not worth the risk of annoying the judge and the other riders. For the same reason, he doesn't like schooling on Tuesdays if there are a lot of horses in the ring cantering and jumping around.

Is there anything else we should know about him?

SH: Guilder is a kind and tolerant horse who doesn't hold my mistakes against me. Lately, I've been watching for signs that he is ready to retire, but he is still healthy and strong and wants to do his job. Guilder has been my horse of a lifetime, and he will always have a home with me.



# **JULIA ERICKSON:** BACK IN THE SADDLE AGAIN

After a seven-year hiatus from the show ring, Julia (Neutkens) Erickson is back. New saddle, new breeches, new horse.

That's the great thing about riding, she says. It's a lifelong sport. It just uses different muscle groups.

Julia knows about muscle groups. She's a certified CrossFit coach and Tough Mudder competitor who finds functional fitness really helps her riding.

Since that last horse show with her longtime partner Hassan in 2010, Julia got a degree in communications





from the College of St. Benedict and entered the Army as a logistics officer. She served two tours of duty in Afghanistan and met her husband Wayne, a chief warrant officer and Blackhawk pilot, while they were both stationed in Ft. Drum in upstate New York (where there were no H/J barns). After four years of service, Julia left that vocation for another. She is back to school to become a radiologic technician, still coaching CrossFit and living in Kansas where her husband is stationed.

Now that she doesn't answer to Uncle Sam, horses are again in her life.

Hassan is still hanging around at 28 and retired. His pasture buddy, Sir Calito, is Julia's new mount. We bought him as a colt from a California breeder with the idea that when Julia was out of the service, Cal would be ready for her.

She wasn't sure at first if they would click. Cal was a different ride, sensitive, and a bit spooky, but with plenty of scope. Time in the saddle and a dedication to flat work are paying off as the pair work their way up through the nowmetered classes. What happened to Levels?


Trainers helped prepare Cal while Julia was wearing a uniform. When he arrived in Minnesota as a 3 year old, Michelle Mann at Square Lake Farm helped bring him along, as did Jan Fisk. Cal was finally united full time with his owner in southern Alabama while Wayne was finishing his pilot training. It's been a work in progress ever since with training tips from Amy Lambert of Hye Point Equestrian Centre west of Topeka.



She and Cal have now competed in four horse shows; the last one at Maffitt Lake Equestrian Center, coincidentally Hassan's last show. It felt good to be home.



I went into the Emerging Athletes Program at the Colorado Horse Park not knowing what to expect. I was excited to work with the clinician Kip Rosenthal since after some research, I realized, not only was she a top trainer out of New York who has trained numerous top junior riders but, she was also known for being a sports psychologist. Kip taught us that if you don't put the pressure on at home on getting it done the first time, going to a show will be much harder. She really stressed this concept by not letting us redo the exercises unless she believed the horse was of fault, not the rider. She also taught us that you should have a horse that can come back to you exactly when you want it and go forward exactly when you want it. We worked

on perfecting this with our horses with different exercises. The whole clinic was very centered around the fact that the horse always comes first, which I really appreciated because, I also deeply believe that. The riders at the clinic all had amazing talent and great horses. It was a blast to ride with such great riders that learned from each other and pushed each other. I went into the clinic knowing nothing, but came out of it with my riding stronger and lots of new friends from around the country. I found it incredibly educational and enjoyed myself immensely. I look forward to applying for it next year and would highly recommend it to other riders.

# **ZONE 5-6 JUMPER FINALS**THROUGH MY LENS

This year brought us the fifth annual Zone Children's/ Adult Amateur Jumper Championships, and it was the inaugural year for both the 1.20/1.25m and 1.30/1.35m Zone Junior/Amateur Owner Jumper Championships. Finals for combined Zones 5 and 6 were held August 11-13 at the new HITS Balmoral Park in Crete, IL.

Zone 6 boasted 11 riders across all divisions, with Emily Clemens (Children's/Adult Amateur Jumper) and I representing Minnesota. As a bonus, the Nation's Cup team format on Day 2, and stabling with competitors from Zones 5 and 6, allowed everyone to meet new friends along the way. Our access to the VIP viewing area was another means to bring riders together. It was not unusual to run into a teammate or competitor while watching another class and sharing congratulations or watching rounds together.

I will admit the three day, four class format can be a bit tiresome for the horses mentally, if not physically, even if they come in fit and are used to showing. I think the Jr/AO courses were set soft on height and not exceptionally technical, so they were more than fair, particularly for what several of us anticipated in a Final.

Most everyone in the Jr/AO individual medals and ribbons jumped clear across the four days and were only separated by times from the Day 1 speed class. The footing was fabulous, the stabling is nice (though a bit far from the rings), and the staff and management try very hard to ensure things are running well and with the best interests of the horses and exhibitors in mind.

Based on my experience, I encourage more people to sign up for the 2018 Zone 5-6 Jumper Finals and give it a shot. At this time, there are not enough competitors to split the age groups into under/over 18, or to separate the 1.20/1.25m and the 1.30/1.35m. However, when this event gains more participants it will afford more opportunities for juniors and adults to get recognized as Gold Star Emerging Jumper Riders and participate in the special clinic offered to individual medal winners, as well as sharing some of the ribbons and prize money that is offered.

I have listed a few things you may not know about the

finals and things to think about if you're considering participating in the future:

- The minimum requirement to qualify is to complete the application and earn 20 points (or \$20 won) between December 1 and the cutoff at your declared fence height in USEF-recognized competition.
- So far for Zone 6, everyone who applied and met the minimum requirement by the cutoff has been eligible to attend. We have not had to drop any riders based on qualifying points, so you have nothing to lose in applying!
- Jim Urban and Mark Aplin have been chefs d'équipes for Zone 6 many times at these Finals and would be happy to answer any questions you might have on the format, rules, requirements, etc. You can probably find them at any horse show or look them up online.
- You are welcome to ask me questions about the experience. In general, I'm candid with my thoughts and will happily share what I know with you.
- If this show isn't on your trainer's schedule for next year, perhaps they would be fine with you attending the Zone Jumper Finals with another trainer meeting their approval. That way, you don't have to miss this great opportunity.

This past July, Elzabeth Lampert, Lindsay Vail, Zoe Lampert, and Amelia Batson of Arbor Hill Farm traveled to Oklahoma City, OK for the USHJA Regional Children's and Adult Amateur Hunter Championships. Elzabeth served as the Chef d'Equipe for Zone 6 and led the girls at two weeks of exciting competition at the GO Preview and GO Show put on Queenie Productions at the Oklahoma State Fairgrounds.

2017 marked the second year for this USHJA Championship and this year was bigger and better than last. I personally love that this competition offers something special for 3 foot riders who may not have the means to qualify for something as large scale as

Capital Challenge, the Pennsylvania National, or the Washington International Show in the fall. It also is the only competition in the country that offers junior and amateur riders the opportunity to compete on a team, as well as an individual.

Arbor Hill represented Zone 6 well with strong results in both formats. Amelia Batson, on a combined Zone 6/7 Children's Team and Zoe on the Zone 6 Team, each put in great rides to lock in a Gold and Silver Medal for each team respectively. In the three phases of individual competition, Amelia clenched 5th place overall and Zoe received 8th overall in a very competitive field. Lindsay, riding on a combined Zone 6/7 team, contributed to a silver medal for her team in the

Adult Amateur section, and ended up 5th overall individually.

Despite the extreme July heat, it was a fun two weeks in Oklahoma. Everyone returned with new friends, big ribbons, and tons of memories. It was great to see a stronger representation from Zone 6 this year and we can only hope that this great program continues to grow and that juniors and adults alike add it to their goals and/or bucket list for the future. I hope to be joined by even more Zone 6 riders next year!

#### CHAMPIONSHIPS REWIND

#### The Drive Down-

4:00am the alarm goes off, everything is packed, and we are off to the barn. Thanks to all the incredible staff and family at AHF the entire trailer is ready to go, the horses were groomed and wrapped, and we were loaded and on the road by 5:30. We weren't really looking forward to the 13 1/2 hour drive, but we were so excited to see all of our friends, and get to be in a new ring, we let it go.

#### Week 1-

We arrived at the OKC Fairgrounds around 8:00 after all the traffic, and water breaks that we made the horses. When we pulled in to the Fairgrounds, Mindy Coretz of Farewell Farm, and all of the staff was there to make our unloading much easier! We got all unloaded, unhooked the trailer, and headed to the hotel. Funny story from my experience in OKC......SO, it was 3rd of July, and there were a bunch of fireworks. #### Schooling Day~

I got there, and got on my horse to flat before Mindy schooled him. He could not have been any better! The rest of the horses were absolutely amazing as well!

#### Show Week~

Day one- Almost all of Farewell's horses did the 3' GO Hunters, and my horse went right in the middle. I got on and flatted him, and then Mindy got on and schooled and showed him. I then flatted a few others for Mindy before they wen't in the ring.

Day Two- 5:00 the alarm is off, and we are up, headed to the barn, and there before 6:00. I had a lesson at 6:00 with a few of my friends from FF, with Libby, FF's Head Trainer. Mindy then showed my horse later that afternoon.

Day Three- We had another 6:00 lesson, and then Mindy showed my horse in a class, and then I showed him in a class, and he was perfect!

Day Four- Another 6:00 lesson, and then the first Day of CH Hunters. It was a bit scary looking at how many entries there were, compared to what I am used to! Avery was really good, but the learning curve got me in the second class. Avery and I had a communication error, and I fell off. This mistake made me nervous going forward into the championship week, but it was a good opportunity to learn.

Day Five- What a great Week one! Avery was absolutely flawless, and I had a blast!

#### Week Two and CH/AD Championships-

Day one-All of our horses showed, and they were great, and all ready for Champs!

#### Team Childrens Championships/Wednesday-

Everybody's nerves were very high, and people were very excited!! There was a meeting on Tuesday night where the teams were randomly drawn, and the orders of go were selected by the team Chefs. I was on the Zone 6 Team with Kelsey Brown, Lydia Soucie and Caroline Uffleman, and Amelia was on the combined Zone 6/7 team with Olivia Woods and Mae Pelz. At about 5:00 we went into the schooling ring for our jog. We did the jog in order, so the first person to jog was the first one to show over fences. We then walked our course, and got on our horses for the flat. There were two sections of U/S, and I was in the second section. Later in the evening Lindsay Vail put in two beautiful trips and a high score in the under saddle placing her in fifth, and Amy Coretz (FF) put in two stunning trips as well placing her in fourth. Overall individual day was a blast!

This team format was an incredible opportunity. It was nerve wracking, exciting and rewarding to work together. Knowing that ultimately each individual performance was going to effect the whole team was so different than going in with personal goals.

It was back to showing as usual in our respective divisions. Elliot, Avery and Gatsby were all very good, and we as riders were ok as well. It was fun to compete with others from out of state and to see how we could hold up.

#### Sunday-

This was the last day of showing in OKC, and we really had a great time. The heat was brutal, but the rings were all air-conditioned and you really don't spend much time outside. Lindsay and Amelia flew home, and we finished getting everything loaded on the trailer. The drive home requires a full day, so we left on Monday morning early.

Thank you to My Mom, Ivy, Mindy, Libby, Rolo, Pat, Marcelino, Cris, Samuel, Paco, Horazio, and all the rest of my family and friends who made this trip possible! I had an absolute blast!!!



see her sometimes but we remember the rigorous lives of our previous vet students.


We are enjoying Ashley Slade and her Finnley. She is such a welcome addition to the farm and we are loving cheering her on in the jumper ring.

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#### 2017 MHJA MEMBERSHIP APPLICATION

Welcome to the MHJA! For 2017 there are 2 types of individual memberships:

- Competing Membership: Dues of \$60.00 per year. A Competing Member is entitled to receive all the publications and prize lists, be listed in the directory, participate in MHJA Clinics as a member, and all other regular member benefits, plus the Competing Member and all horses owned by the Competing Member will be eligible for MHJA Year-End Awards. In order to be eligible for a year-end award in the hunter or jumper classes, the owner of the horse must be an MHJA Competing Member. If you are riding a leased horse, please be sure the owner is an MHJA member in order for points to count. To be eligible for an equitation award, the rider must be an MHJA Competing Member.
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Both memberships run December 1 to November 30, the same as USEF and USHJA. Membership becomes active on its postmark date if mailed or date received by a representative of the MHJA if hand delivered. All memberships expire on November 30, regardless of the date activated. The 2017 membership list will be purged on March 1, 2017. If you have not renewed or joined by then, you will not receive any more mailings or be listed in the 2017 directory. The MHJA sends reminders before the March 1 deadline. It is the member's responsibility to make sure all the membership requirements are met for eligibility for awards.
